The honoring of the 80th birthday of Mrs. Nellie Eudaly Graham, Sunday, at her home, near West Grove church, in Jackson township, was a day of interest and delight, as many of her former pupils were present and relatives and friends gathered in large numbers.

Mrs. Graham is the widow of Alfred Graham, a former well-known school teacher and farmer of Wayne and Jackson townships. The family home is now on what was for many years the Jesse Foulke farm, northwest of Deming, and here Mrs. Graham has lived for the past thirty-five years, surrounded by the loving care and devotion of her sons and daughters.

At one time, Mrs. Graham was one of the favorite teachers of the county, having taught school for twenty-seven years, beginning sixty-four years ago, teaching in Adams, Washington and Wayne townships, and she is held in loving memory by many hundreds of pupils, there being more than one hundred of these pupils present, Sunday.

The guests brought food to make up a bounteous dinner, including a birthday cake baked by Mrs. John D. Cornelius, of Wayne township, representing the Willow Branch school. A fine gift of a blanket was presented by the former pupils at the school, near Boxley, familiarly called the Henpeck school. Many flowers and other gifts were also presented in honor of Mrs. Graham, whose expression of appreciation of the honors conferred was heartfelt and most gracious.

The weather prevented the spreading of the dinner in the big yard, but the house afforded room and the dinner was a fine social occasion and was much enjoyed.

The program following the dinner, was short, but interesting. Harvey Eudaly, a brother of Mrs. Graham, presiding. John P. Bradfield, who was the trustee of Adams township when Mrs. Graham taught, was present, and notwithstanding his 87 years, made a fine talk and recited a most interesting poem in a fine way. Floyd Zimmerman, who taught in Wayne township at the same time with Mrs. Graham, made a fine address, in well chosen words, and also gave a poem. Music was given by Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Huffman, and their daughter, of Wayne township. E. E. Neal made a short talk and Mrs. Philip Simmonds gave some interesting reminiscences. The eldest brother of Mrs. Graham, William Eudaly, of Middletown, Ohio, closed the program with a fine talk, expressing the family's appreciation of the honors shown his sister. Mr. Eudaly is a lawyer, and also takes much interest in religious and Sunday school work in his home city.
